Alum Rock Counseling Center



This agency is a community-based organization which provides lowcost, multilingual, and culturally sensitive services to the multi-ethnic residents of eastern Santa Clara County. Some of the services include adult and family counseling; after-school activities for "at risk" or gang-involved youth; and parenting classes for the parents of these same children.

Annually, the agency serves over 4,000 families and individuals in the Adult & Family Counseling and Crisis Programs and well over 500 persons in the Substance Abuse Program. Over 80% of the clientele served are ethnic minorities and some are classified as very low income families.

The ARCC will use its grant to enhance their current counseling and parenting education services to Hispanic children and families through the purchase of children's therapeutic playroom equipment, culturally relevant parenting videos, and printed educational materials. ARCC will also produce new Spanish language program brochures to enhance their community outreach efforts.

**Catholic** Charities



The Catholic Charities Immigration Program assists thousands of low-income immigrants and their families in Santa Clara County by providing quality, low-cost, immigration legal services and a vehicle for their voice, i.e. self-empowerment gained through naturalization

CCIP assists over 20,000 clients per year. Clients are primarily Hispanic. The program's main goal is to respond to the ongoing needs of Hispanic immigrant families by 1) making them aware of quality, low-cost immigration legal services, 2) informing them of their legal rights as documented or undocumented immigrants, and, 3) educating them of the immense advantages and benefits of naturalization.

The CCIP will use its grant for the new Immigration Outreach Theatre Project. The project is an innovative outreach approach which links the cultural arts with social services. It will take Spanish language popular theatre, containing information on immigration rights and citizenship, to Mexican and other Latino immigrants and their families in Santa Clara County and provide information critical to the survival of these

Since its inception, the Hispanic Charity Ball has allocated over \$92,000 to local community service agencies providing critically needed services to Hispanic youth and families.

This year's four grant recipients were selected in advance of this evening in an effort to increase community visibility and support for the very important services these four agencies provide in making Santa Clara County a healthier and happier place to live.

The selection process is competitive and volunteer-driven. Nonetheless, the four agencies manage to surface easily and be recognized as exceptional agencies which rightfully deserve the funding and contributions.

We are proud to announce the following Grant Recipients of the 1994 Hispanic Charity Ball:

Sacred Heart Community Services



Sacred Heart Community Services serves very low-income people in Santa Clara County with emergency services. Some of the services include emergency food boxes, clothes, job placement, education, housing assistance, on-site healthcare, and an information and referral service.

Over 75% of the families assisted are Hispanic. Today, over 1,100 volunteers provide these comprehensive services to more than 75,000 individuals and families.

SHCS will use their grant to support the educational services designed to impact over 1,000 very lowincome children and adults through several education programs. The project will provide direct services to pre-school and school-aged children in the Moms and Tots Program, the After-School Homework Clinic, and the Academic Summer Day Camp. This project has the major goal of empowering both children and their families to access the education and services available to them in their community.

#### Pathway Society

Pathway Society promotes community wellness by helping individuals and families who suffer from substance abuse. Pathway offers the community four programs for youth: the

Pathway House, the Out-patient Program, the Youth Intervention and Education Program, and the Public Awareness Program.

Pathway Society's main program, Todos Sin Drogas, provides treatment services to low-income Hispanic youth who suffer from alcohol or other drug abuse, and who are involved with gang activities. 75% of the participants in Todos Sin Drogas are Hispanic. A recent survey found that this program drastically reduces alcohol and drug use among the participating youth, improves attendance and participation in school, reduces criminal behavior and gang activity, and improves social functioning.

Pathway will use its grant to help more Hispanic youth from low-income families to establish the willpower and understanding to get off of alcohol and drugs and get out of gangs. The program will provide weekly group counseling sessions and monthly clean and sober outings.

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# Poncho Sanchez Latin Jazz Band

oncho Sanchez has become one of the preeminent conga players and percussionists in America. Musician magazine stated, "As a percussionist, he's L.A.'s answer to Mongo Santamaria; as a band leader, Poncho Sanchez's crisp arrangements, Cubop flair, and informed jazz sensibility bear comparison to Machito's."

The youngest of eleven, Poncho was born in Laredo, Texas to Mexican parents and raised in Norwalk, California. Poncho taught himself to play guitar at age 12, and went on to play the flute, drums, timbales, and the congas at age 18. In 1975, while playing in local bands, Cal Tjader, the man

he idolized, asked him to become a member of the Tjader band. Their close musical and personal relationship lasted until Tjader's untimely death in 1982.

Poncho toured extensively with Tjader and recorded numerous albums, including the Grammy award winning "La Onda Va Bien." He performed and recorded with other jazz luminaries, including Carmen McRae, Clare Fischer, and Woody Herman.

In 1982 he recorded his first album, "Sonando" released by Concord Picante. His second release with Concord Picante, "Bien Sabroso," was nominated for a Grammy award. In 1991, Concord Picante released a live recording entitled "A Night at Kimball's East" featuring driving conga rhythms and machine gun fire solos. And in June 1993, "Bailar" was released as the second-half of "A Night at Kimball's East" and holds all the same energy and excitement of a spectacular live performance as the first recording.

The Poncho Sanchez Band travels the world from the Concord Jazz Festival, Kimball's and Yoshi's in the San Francisco area, to the Village Gate in New York, and on to venues throughout Europe. The Poncho Sanchez Band has performed on The Today Show, The Late Show with Arsenio Hall, and Charles Kuralt's Sunday Morning Show.

Poncho was part of an allstar band on David Letterman's Anniversary Show on national TV in 1990.

The hands of Poncho Sanchez can smack a conga drum with riveting, rhythmic jolts, providing the central core beat that his Latin band thrives on and is known for. "Eighty per cent of my hands are calluses. People say it's like shaking hands with a 2" by 4", laughs Sanchez.

Who better to carry on the traditions of Mongo Santamaria, Machito, Tito Puente, and Cal Tjader... than "King Conga," Poncho Sanchez. He will continue to generate a torrent of fiery Latin jazz and take it to even greater heights for many years to come.

In addition to writing and reporting the news, Maggi also contributes behind the camera on many special projects such as co-hosting KNTV's "Volunteer-A-Thon" and "Celebration of Courage" programs. She also acts as moderator of televised political debates.


other television

The family is nominated by a member of the local community and selected by an HCB selection committee comprised of volunteer past-Familia Award recipients.

We are proud to announce the Familia Carrillo as the 1994 Familia Award recipients.

Jose Transito and Maria Cruz Carrillo together have raised eleven children. Jose and Maria have offered their home to homeless families and clothed them as well. They are both active in their church, belong to La Sociedad Guadalupana, and have volunteered for the U.S. Census.

Jose is dedicated to many causes and organizations such as Raza Si, and the community garden "Mi Tierra Jardin." Musically talented, he is a member of Los Mensajeros Mariachi group and plays various instruments in his church choir. Jose is a part of the Bilingual Education Committees at Horace Mann Elementary School, Peter Burnett Junior High, and Hilltop High School. He has also helped build a playground at Horace Mann Elementary and painted bleachers for San Jose High School.

As a minister of her church, Maria is also very active in her church and is part of the Movimiento Familiar Cristiano. She has held mass and bible study in her home. Maria often feeds the homeless and refers them for various jobs. She too is active with the schools, volunteering as yard duty teacher and serving lunch to the



children at Horace Mann Elementary School. Maria collects clothing and pays a dedicated yearly visit to a Tijuana orphanage to distribute the clothing.

Jose and Maria's eleven children are sons Luis, Rafael, Juan, Martin, and daughters Estela, Angelica, Maria Elena, Carmen, Indelisa, Carolina, and Patricia. Jose and Maria have put in many years of dedication and labor toward their children. The fruits of their labor are obvious in the next generation of Carrillos who have already taken their place in the community. Two of their children are doctors, one is a school administrator, another is in real estate, one is studying to be a lawyer, and several of them dance in professional folkloric

dance companies. But all of them equally continue the struggle to advance the Hispanic community through education and assistance to those less fortunate.

One learns from the Carrillo Family how to be a part of the community and retain their special heritage. They are a family comprised of winners. They have built the community, created solidarity, and contributed to American society in ways many only dream of. ## Virginia Olivares ARTIST

The bold colors, expression, sentiment, and pictorial rhythm have long been trademark of Olivares' paintings. The remarkable ability to exploit the woven colors of indigenous costumes, the life of primitive structures, and the hopeful facial expressions of village inhabitants has captivated interest in the arts communities of Latin America, California, and Arizona for over two decades. All her subjects are creatively depicted in the smallest of detail expounded by the vivid colors as souvenir impressions of her 12-year experience in Central and South America as well as her childhood in Tucson.

Internationally renown and self-taught, Olivares has participated in art shows in various Latin American countries exhibiting her paintings and scenes of villages and people from Ecuador, Peru, Panama, and Guatemala. In Venezuela, she chaired the VAAUW


(Venezuelan-American Association of University Women) Gallery and promoted women artists while participating herself in many shows.

Over the years, her style has varied whilst continuing to perfect the smallest of details with every show and project. Olivares has recently ventured and commercialized her talents with Mexicana Airlines and the San Jose International Mariachi Conference in California. She has stretched her talents and creativity into other mediums such as fine art prints, logo design, post cards, and posters.

Today, she partners with the Hispanic Charity Ball and delivers an explosion of color and tradition in her rendition of the

annual fundraiser and its significance in the community. Only 500 limited edition prints have been reproduced for the Hispanic Charity Ball's 5th anniversary celebration and all the proceeds from the print sales have been donated to this year's fundraiser by this talented local artist.














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
